All students age 13 and up are asked to register for a free library card through the New York Public Library. We have students at SCC who come from all different school districts and have different local public library cards. In order to work together in classes, SCC will be using the NYPL to teach research and accessing proper sources across all disciplines and all grades. Students younger than 13 are ineligible to apply.

Please follow these important steps:

- Go to this website: NYPL
- At the top of the page, click "Get a Library Card"
- Scroll down to "Get Started"
- Apply for a Library Card by inputting the student's information
- You do not need to sign up for messages from the NYPL if you don't want to
- Alternate Addresses are for PO Boxes
- You will be asked to create a unique username and password
- You do not need to select a Home Library, it will autofill to SimplyElibrary
- Once submitted, you will see a screen with a virtual card take a picture of this
- Then, please send an email to <u>patronaccounts@nypl.org</u> along with a picture of the student's id or license or permit with the following message:

Please see attached documentation to verify residency for my newly issued library card, barcode #. [input your unique barcode number] Thank you.

- Once this has been done, and your residency has been verified, you will be able to use the NYPL. If you have any trouble with this, we will be happy to help our students accomplish this in the fall; it will just save time if the process can be completed over the summer. Questions?
