

## SUMMER LIBRARY CHALLENGE AND LIBRARY SCAVENGER HUNT

This challenge is meant to encourage students to visit their local library and find out all of the great things that local libraries have to offer. When you complete these library challenges, you will discover new books, great authors, as well as all of the extras your library has to offer. The grade with the most students who complete the challenge will earn an ice cream or popsicle party in September! Have Fun!

*The following challenges are designed to help your family explore the various sections of the library. They are specifically designed for you and your kids to do together. All the suggestions are easily adaptable to your own interests and your children's reading level.*

**Challenge 1:** Visit your local library and sign up for their summer reading programs. Adults: you have the opportunity to set a good example and sign up for your own adult summer reading program! Students: you can sign up for the youth or teen program at most local libraries. See if you can complete the summer reading program!

**Challenge 2:** The Fiction Challenge! **Students:** Find the display section for new fiction books in either the Young Adult or Teen section, and check out two new titles that the librarians have placed there. Read

them! **Adults:** Tell your student about your favorite three classic stories. Show them how to use the library catalog to locate them in the library. Consider checking one out and reading it together!

**Challenge 3:** The Non-Fiction Challenge! **Students:** Choose a topic that you would like to find out more about. This can be anything that interests you, an event in history, an important person, or something that you would like to further understand. **Adults:** Help your child learn the Dewey Decimal Classification system, which is how non-fiction books are sorted and shelved. You will need to understand the basics of this system (*or the system your library uses*) in order to locate the call numbers of the books of their chosen topic. If you and your children are not familiar with how Dewey Decimal works your first challenge is to ask your librarian!

**Challenge 4:** Fun Events! Most libraries offer fun things to do, aside from books. See if there is a newsletter with a list of activities that the library has to offer this summer. Sign up for two activities, one that the student can do with the adult, and one the student can do on their own.

**Adults:** Please help your student keep track of the library visits and activities you have participated in to submit to teachers in the fall.


